The **Healthcare Leadership in Quality Track** is a novel, two-year, immersive training program that is integrated into residency training program. Residents from any graduate medical education training program are welcome to apply. The program is supported by the Office of the Chief Medical Officer at Penn and has been recognized nationally as an innovation in graduate medical education.

A one-year **Certificate Program for Fellows & Chief Residents** is a newly created program designed to provide trainees with curriculum and experiences in the practice of quality improvement and patient safety over the course of one year.

The CHIPS Fellowship is a concentration within the prestigious Masters of Science of Health Policy Training Program at the University of Pennsylvania. Fellows or junior faculty with a career interest in this area complete both a research thesis project on a quality topic and a capstone quality improvement project.
